2019 Lenten Worship Schedule

Sermon on the Mount

This series for Lent takes parishioners through some of the most familiar teachings of Jesus from his Sermon on the Mount in Matthew 5-7 and relates them to the events



surrounding Christ's life, death and resurrection. In the process, the services will powerfully reveal that the cross itself is the ultimate sermon on the mount for our journey of faith in this sacred season.

March 6, 2019 – 7:00p.m., St. Philip Lutheran Church Ash Wednesday worship with the Imposition of Ashes Blessed are You, Matthew 5:1-11

In this service, we remember that we who are poor in spirit, who mourn, and who hunger and thirst for righteousness are called blessed by our Savior. Ash Wednesday reminds us that though we have been brought low by sin, our Lord will bless us with new life in him through the cross.

March 13, 2019 - 7:00p.m., Trinity Lutheran Church, Rev. John McCandlish preaching

Salt and Light • Matthew 5:13-16

Christ calls us to be salt and light in this world of sin. We who have tasted and seen his great love for us on the cross can spend our Lent savoring his salvation and shining with his glory and grace in the places where he has put us.

March 20, 2019 - 7:00p.m., Glade Creek Lutheran Church, Rev. David Derrick preaching

Prayer and Fasting • Matthew 6:5-18

Lent is a season of prayer and fasting. We grow in our relationship with Christ by communicating with him, and we learn more about him and ourselves by giving up those things that can distract us from our connection to him.

Do Not Worry • Matthew 6:25-34

So much of our lives, even in Lent, is spent worrying about what might happen or what has happened. Christ teaches us to stop being anxious, but simply to trust that he knows what is best and will take care of us to the very end.

Palm Sunday, April 14, 2019, 8:30a.m. & 11:00a.m.

This worship begins as we gather in front of the church (weather permitting) with the *Procession of* Palms, remembering the triumphal entry of Jesus into the city of Jerusalem.

Maundy Thursday, April 18, 2019 – 6:00p.m.

We gather in the fellowship hall for wine, cheese, and hors d'oeuvres. This night we remember the disciples gathered in the upper room for Passover and the Last Supper. After the meal, we will move to the sanctuary for Holy Communion and the Stripping of the Altar.

Good Friday, April 19, 2019 -7:00p.m.

We gather in the sanctuary for the service of Tenebrae which means darkness. This service involves the

reading of the Passion Story and the extinguishing of candles as we remember our Lord's suffering and death, as well as the disciples' denial and flight.

Church Council News -February

Council met on Tuesday, February 12, 2019 at 7:00 p.m. in the church library. Peter Shick, Treasurer, reported receipts for January were \$28,720.44. After monthly expenses there is excess income for the month of \$10,217.96.

Rod Dillman, Property Chairman discussed a quote from Salem Paving to repair the parking lot entrance to the church and the driveway to the parsonage. Salem Paving will do the repairs to two parts in order for there to Mark's Lutheran to participate in this be access to the church property. Pastor David requested the work not to overlap with Lent and Easter activities. Council approved this expenditure of \$36,550 along with a \$4,000 contingency to be used to seal the remainder of the parking lot if

necessary. The money for this expenditure will be taken from the Long Term Investment Fund.

St. Philip's Mission Site Plan has been filed with the Synod office and the church may now receive applications for staffing from rostered candidates. The Search Team is in the process of setting up advertisement with Zip Recruiter for lay candidates.

A Lay Leaders Training Pilot has been created by the Synod, and St Philip has been invited along with College Lutheran, Wheatland Lutheran and St pilot. This was made possible by a grant from ELCA. Training will be provided by Synodical staff. The expectations for this training are to empower congregations in lay leadership to do well. It will be a two year commitment that includes a

retreat at Roanoke College, Webinar, internet tools and a Synod event. Pastor David and four others from the congregation will be invited to participate in the pilot. These persons will critique the training to further create the future curriculum. Pastor David will make the invitation to participate.

Council voted to accept Chuck Jecminek's resignation from council. Council submitted names of members of the congregation to serve on the Nominating Committee for Council. Pastor David will contact folks suggested for the committee.

The congregation has been invited to work with Habitat for Humanity on a build in the Roanoke Valley. Council discussed names of congregation members who might serve as the contact and organizer.

Food Pantry Report and Thank You

St. Mark's Lutheran Food Pantry expresses deep gratitude for the strong support of St. Philip's members. The long-standing partnership between the two churches includes a remarkable donation of 970 items of food and \$75.00 by St. Philip members during the recent February 3 Souper Bowl of

Caring drive sponsored by the St. Philip Youth Groups. St. Philipian Selise Miller follows her parents' many years of hard work arranging for this food donation. Thank you, Selise and the Youth!

In 2018 food and monetary donations from St. Philip enabled the St. Mark's Food Pantry to provide full bags of food for 939 families (2,520 people). In addition to Food Pantry operations twice a month, St. Mark's Lutheran

volunteers use the monthly donations of food for distribution of 50 food bags and boxes at Thanksgiving, Christmas and Easter. These are distributed to families selected by Roanoke Social Services and Hurt Park Elementary School. St. Philip's donations along with assistance from Feeding America Southwest Virginia continue a long tradition of St. Mark's efforts to meet the needs of hungry neighbors for more than 30 years.

O Sacred Head, Now Wounded

One of the favorite hymns used often during the Lenten Season is "O Sacred Head, Now Wounded." It was written by Bernard of Clairvaux (1091-1153) who founded the Cistercian order of monks in the early 12th century.

The original hymn had seven verses honoring Jesus' feet, knees, hands, sides, breast, heart, and head. The words have been changed considerably throughout the years and are not the same in all hymnals. However, all the different versions include the first verse which begins, "O sacred head, now wounded, with grief and shame weighed down." The text honors Christ for suffering on the cross for us. The

words ask how we can love and thank him enough. Of course, we can never love or thank him enough, but are to give Him our faith and devotion not our perfection.
