HOLY WEEK WORSHIP SCHEDULE

Palm Sunday, April 14, 2019, 8:30a.m. & 11:00a.m.

This worship begins as in front of the church (weather permitting) with the Procession of Palms, remembering the triumphal entry of Jesus into the city of Jerusalem.

Maundy Thursday, April 18, 2019 – 6:00p.m.

Gather in the fellowship hall for wine, cheese, and hors d'oeuvres. This night remember the disciples gathered in the upper room for Passover and the Last Supper. After the meal, move to the sanctuary for Holy Communion and the Stripping of the Altar.

Good Friday, April 19, 2019 - 7:00p.m.

Gather in the sanctuary for the service of Tenebrae which means darkness. This service involves the reading of the Passion Story and the extinguishing of candles as we remember our Lord's suffering and death, as well as the disciples' denial and flight.

This Easter extend an invitation to a friend, a co-worker, an extended



Global Mission

Pastor David, Gary Dudley, and Judy Brammer attended a strategic networking event for congregations and synods in the ELCA (Evangelical Lutheran Church in America) connected to partners in Southern Africa. Because St. Philip connects to the church in Malawi, Africa the group traveled to Chicago and the national Lutheran church center to participate March 10-12. So many wonderful interactions happened in three short days. There were opportunities to meet with pastors and Global Mission committee persons who share similar experiences. These meetings involved getting to know you activities, small group discussions, best practices and reports from colleges, YAGM (Young

Adults in Global Mission), and Gender Justice as well as worship together.

Discussions centered around engaging in mission through the accompaniment model in which we remember that life in Christ comes through community found in mutuality and interdependence. The five values which are included in the accompaniment model are mutuality, inclusivity, vulnerability, empowerment and sustainability. The St. Philip Global Mission team will focus on these values as moving forward in the congregations relationship with fellow children of God in Malawi.

Another highlight of the trip was meeting the mission team from Northwest Wisconsin. They are the

official companion synod with Malawi and have been very active in supporting the Evangelical Church in Malawi for many years. St. Philip's Global Mission team hopes to work together with them and possibly even combine Mission trips. The team from Northwest Wisconsin invited Bishop Bvumbwe and his wife Maria to come to the gathering. It was good to see the bishop and his wife. They are planning to visit the St Philip family the last weekend of April 26-28. Please mark your calendars for that time so they can experience a warm welcome for their visit.

One more big THANK YOU to the St. Philip family for shared ministry with the church in Malawi and for making this trip possible to continue to build those relationships.

For the past 25 years one of the most gratifying ministries at St. Philip has been a semi-annual blood drive held in May and October each year. Altar Guild – Each Sunday the living Christ is experienced at the altar. The altar guild serves to make sure the table is ready and at special worship services throughout the year. Search Committee Update

The search committee has been working hard over the last several months to define the needs of the congregation and craft a job description which speaks to an ideal candidate and communicates needs to whomever God places in front of the congregation. The position will be listed with the title of Community Ministries Coordinator and will work toward proclaiming the gospel; developing and implementing congregational programming; and identifying, recruiting, and empowering lay volunteers and church resources to support our ministries.

The committee will pursue two main avenues for advertising the position and attracting candidates. First, with the help of Pastor Kelly and the Bishop's office, The committee is making the position available to all clergy staff, also known as "rostered" candidates which will also include current serving deacons and seminary candidates nationwide. Second, it is advertising the position through traditional online placement and will be using Zip Recruiter's website to accomplish this. It is the committee's belief that this will provide them with exposure to a broad range of backgrounds and skill sets. Finally, the committee will be providing job information to congregational newsletters in the region in hopes that

members of the wider Lutheran family may feel called to respond to the church's need.

Over the next few weeks, the committee will be tracking and assessing candidates, including conducting interviews. The committee will continue to consult and advise the church council on its progress and the congregation will be informed as it progresses toward the hiring of a new staff member. Anyone who is interested in seeing the job description or has comments or questions is encouraged to speak to members of the search committee, Mike Parker, Linda Hudson, Max Holland, Cynda Johnson, or Shannon Radmacher.

Church Council News – March

Council met on Tuesday, March 19, 2019 at 7:00 p.m. in the church library.

Peter Shick, Treasurer, reported the receipts for February were \$23,401.87. After monthly expenses the church shows excess income for the month of \$3,822.00.

Endowment Disbursements and Capital Improvements were discussed. Council voted to designate \$6,000.00 to fund the intern ministry. \$5,000.00 seed money to be used for new ministry with the addition of new staff, \$2,000.00 to Habitat for Humanity and \$2,000.00 for General Maintenance needs as they develop.

The search committee asked for clarification on position being full time or part time. Council directed them to proceed looking for a full time position person, ordained or not.

Pastor David reported that he, Maribeth Schemer, Liz Leonard, Gary Sahm and one additional person will participate in a Lay Leader Training Pilot Program through the Virginia Synod.

Pastor David, Gary Dudley and Judy Brammer attended Global Mission ELCA Strategic Plan meeting in Chicago on March 10-12, 2019. Ideas from the meeting were discussed. Gary will host a Q & A session between services on March 24. He also reported that Bishop Bvumbue will be in the

Roanoke Valley April 26 through April 28 and will worship with St. Philip on Sunday, April 28.

The stewardship campaign, Generosity Matters, will kick off in less than nine days with the help of Brian Katz, Dan Radmacher, and others. It will go out electronically to congregation to estimate financial resources for God's mission through St. Philip.

The Virginia Synod Assembly will be held on Friday and Saturday only this year, June 7 and 8. St. Philip delegates to the assembly are needed.

The Congregation Meeting will be held on Sunday, April 14 at 10am for election of new council members.
