26 Years of Life Giving Ministry

For the past 26 years one of the most gratifying ministries at St. Philip has been a semi-annual blood drive held in May and October each year. Started by St. Philip members Margaret Mitchell, Ruth Farmer, Virginia Cassell, and Helen Miller in 1993, blood drives hosted by St. Philip Lutheran have

collected a total of nearly 9,000 units of blood and have saved over 26,500 lives.

Church Council News -February 2020

Council met on Tuesday, February 11, 20202 at 7:00 pm in the church library. •

Peter Shick, Treasurer, distributed the Treasurer's report for the month ending January 31, 2020. Treasurer's report showed receipts for the month \$25,513.27, and \$1676.20 under budget. All major expenses have been paid to date.

The Staff Compensation Taskforce Update Merit and step increases were discussed and approved by Council as proposed effective immediately, motion made by Gary Dudley, seconded by Shannon Radmacher. Summary of staff compensation is as follows:

Council approved \$10,022 for 2020 Compensation increases for staff. Only \$4000 was allowed for in the 2020 Spending Plan that was approved in December 2019. Council approved the additional funding of \$6,022 to come from the St. Philip non-dedicated short -term investment account. There are a several reasons for the increases.

It came to council's attention that Pastor David's salary had fallen below ELCA recommended minimum pay for a Pastor with his number of years in pastoral ministry, so a one-time adjustment was made to correct that.

- The increases reflect the gratitude and appreciation of a congregation that has been blessed with outstanding pastoral leadership, and ample financial resources.
- The increases reflect the congregation's gratitude and appreciation for all the extra work and added pressure on our entire staff during a 2-year period of being understaffed, while at the same time, maintaining a thriving and growing ministry.

A motion was made, discussed and approved to have parsonage utility expenses (gas and electric) paid by St. Philip. ELCA Compensation guidelines strongly recommend that parsonage utilities should be paid by the congregation, and not the pastor. Pastor Derrick has been paying these in the past, but the decision was made to follow the recommendation of the guidelines.

Pastor Laura reported on several recent successful events, including Winterfest/Chili Cookoff, the first meeting of the "Open Book" club, and Open Doors. Some upcoming events include an Anti-Scamming Workshop, the three "Celebrate Life" educational events in March, the first Community Café, and Fat Tuesday Steak Dinner.

A Nominating Committee has been named to select Council representatives for the upcoming term. Elizabeth Reiter, Jodi Hendrickson and at 7 pm. Pastor David will prepare a slate of

candidates for the April Congregational meeting. Pastor's reports were received from both Pastor Laura and Pastor David. Pastor David was pleased to report that Keith Olivier, a Chaplain at Brandon Oaks, has agreed to fill in as interim organist during the summer months. Judy Burnette will be recuperating from planned hand surgery.

A thank you letter was received from Pastor Shawn Hannon of Hope Community Center in Arcade NY, thanking St. Philip for our contributions to purchase bricks for a community center building campaign. Pastor Hannon also wrote a touching personal note to Pastor Derrick, which Pastor Derrick read to the group. Copies of Pastor Hannon's thank you letter to the congregation will be posted around church soon.

Lent Season is approaching and St. Philip will conduct Ash Wednesday services. The Lenten mid-week services/soup suppers will be in rotation again this year. St. Philip will host once this year due to St. Marks joining the group rotation.

Pastor David reported plans are in progress to place a Luther Rose on the outside of the church building to memorialize Bob Farmer's contribution to the life of St. Philip.



O Sacred Head, Now Wounded

One of the favorite hymns used often during the Lenten Season is "O Sacred Head, Now Wounded." It was written by Bernard of Clairvaux (1091-1153) who founded the Cistercian order of monks in the early 12th century.

The original hymn had seven verses honoring Jesus' feet, knees, hands, sides, breast, heart, and head. The words have been changed considerably throughout the years and are not the same in all hymnals. However, all the different versions include the first verse which begins, "O sacred head, now wounded, with grief and shame weighed down." The text honors Christ for suffering on the cross for us. The words ask how we can love and thank him enough. Of course, we can never love or thank him enough, but are to give Him our faith and devotion not our perfection.
