### **Pastoral Updates**

Pastor David and Pastor Laura

Keep awake therefore, for you know neither the day nor the hour. With these words from the Gospel of Matthew, Jesus teaches his disciples to live into the kingdom of God even as the uncertainty and unpredictability of the world is ever present. These words likely speak to our current experience. So much is uncertain, unpredictable, and unknown. Yet, St. Philippians we are still to live into the kingdom of God.



We continue to face complications from an unpredictable Corona Virus. We, your pastors, want to thank our COVID Preparedness Team for continuing to help us respond to the ongoing complications this challenge creates. Congregation members can help by continuing to make suggestions and providing feedback to one of the preparedness team members - Shannon Radmacher, Donna Wright, Dan Horine, Marlene Craig, or Nancy Shadix. Always remember that we are a faithful community who lives out faith even as long practiced traditions change and new ways of doing ministry take shape.

We are still to live into the kingdom of God - a kingdom that values all of creation and that craves justice. There is so much in our world that is hurting and there is injustice surrounding us all the time, but right now the church has the unique opportunity to speak to the painful hurt and suffering of intrinsic racism. We, as your pastors, want to help lead not only that conversation, but also faithful response. ### Church Council News – June 2020

Council met on Tuesday, June 9, 2020 at 7:00 pm via Zoom.

The Treasurer's report showed receipts for month ending May 31, 2020 of \$23,026.58. Expenses for May were only \$5699.96 due to a credit of \$17,312.00 in payroll expenses covered by the CARES Act Payroll Protection Program. The Payroll Protection Plan payment we received will cover 10 weeks of payroll expenses for St. Philip. Year-to-date through May 31 receipts equal \$121,812.00 and expenses were \$103,912.47.

A project team has been appointed, and a meeting has been scheduled for June 18, 2020 to discuss needed updates to our constitution.

Pastor David reported the Preschool balance sheet was very low due to the loss of classes and summer camp due to COVID 19 and funds were needed to meet payroll through August. Council passed a motion to gift the Preschool with \$5,000.00 to enable them to meet payroll through August. The money will come from cash

reserves we have accumulated so far this year.

Pastor Laura updated council on the church database management client called Breeze. Council members were sent an email as the test group to log into Breeze to look for their profiles, make edits to it, and to review the website. She reported the application can be downloaded to your phone or used on a web browser on a computer for free. Once information in the current membership database has been completely migrated to Breeze, and each member given the opportunity to make edits and upload photos, the system will allow us to print picture directories on-demand.

Danielle Murray resigned her position of preschool director effective July 1to take a full-time position with a child care facility in Blacksburg. Council expressed their gratitude to Danielle for her six years of ministry to the St. Philip Preschool and congregation.

A Zoom meeting was held last week with Pastors, Shannon Radmacher, Dan Horine, Nancy Shadix and Donna Wright on plans for returning to inperson gatherings and procedures on getting back in the sanctuary.

The cross on the roof has been cleaned and painted.

Our sanctuary has several spots in the carpet upfront in the aisles and around the altar which have lifted because these are high traffic areas. Rod Dillman reported the only way to repair this is to replace the carpet in those areas. It has been suggested we do this before we have the pews and the rest of the carpet cleaned. Council is waiting for a quote from him as to the cost to replace the carpet.

Council passed a motion to give a \$500.00 donation to the Roanoke Chapter of NAACP. The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People is the oldest, largest and strongest civil rights organization in the United States.

Pastor Laura reported we have been approved for "We are Church Together Daily Bread" matching grant for a \$250 from the VA Synod. This grant will be used to purchase food and supplies for Melrose Towers. A "God's Work, Our hands" event for Melrose Towers will be held on July 26.

The next council meeting is on July 7, 2020 at 7:00 pm via ZOOM.

#### Dear Pastor David Derrick:

On behalf of Church Council, the staff, and the whole congregation, we want to congratulate you on your twenty (20) years of Pastoral Service to the Congregation of St. Philip Evangelical Lutheran Church.

Thank you for your joyous dedication, hard work, inspirational leadership, and faithful service.

I wish we could have done this in a more formal, celebratory manner, but the reason we are doing this open letter in the newsletter is not only to congratulate and thank you, but to also "let the cat out of the bag."

Back in February of this year council began a conversation about recognizing your service in a surprise celebration event in May. Well, we all know what happened to prevent that from happening.

In the February meeting of Church Council, during a session when you and Pastor Laura were invited to leave the room for a few minutes to allow discussion of compensation increases, we ALSO discussed your 20-year anniversary! As a result of that session, a motion was made, seconded, discussed and approved by Council to earmark \$5,000 for a gift to a benevolence of YOUR choice, in honor of your service. We, of course, did not inform you of this decision at the time.

What precipitated this "confession" is the fact that your anniversary day came and went in May, without any public recognition, and that was an oversight we regret. However, the idea of conducting an event to celebrate your ministry with us is still a goal.

In addition, our Endowment Committee just approved the distribution of \$16,000 from our Endowment Fund for 2020 in their meeting on Monday, June 15<sup>th</sup>. It did not seem prudent to continue to keep our decision a secret any longer, when we should be making plans for how to allocate this disbursement in 2020.

Begin to give some thought about *your choice* of a benevolence to receive the \$5,000!

Thank you again for your Service, as we celebrate your ministry among us with this gift.
