Return to Indoor Worship

The COVID-19 pandemic has indeed presented many challenges for all of us, perhaps most challenging of all is the inability to gather as we normally do. We've missed connecting in-person and sharing faith and fellowship in the "normal" ways. But, we give thanks that throughout this pandemic we have not ceased to be a church community! True to the St. Philip mission statement, we have continued to love, feed, and serve - just in different ways! Most importantly, we have continued our worship life together through weekly digital worship service, conference call, and drive-up services.

At the October meeting, the St. Philip Church Council voted to return to indoor worship on November 15, 2020. This is an important decision and this article will give you some helpful information. First, the return to indoor worship will not change current digital offerings. Open Doors online service will still happen at 11am on Sundays, while also being posted on the church website and Facebook page. We will also continue to offer the conference call service at 11am. If you feel most comfortable continuing to worship in this way, please do! Christ meets us right where we are and unites us a community, even while worshipping in different spaces.

The indoor worship service will be one service at 9:30am with overflow seating in the Fellowship Hall, if needed. While we are returning to indoor worship, this does not mean that the threat of the pandemic is gone! We want to gather together to worship but will do so in a way that follows public health guidance. Masks and social distancing will be observed. Music will be included in a variety of ways during the service, but there will be no congregational singing. We will commune in our seats, much like the drive up service. If you, or a member of your family is not feeling well, or is quarantined, please worship digitally.

As we get closer to November 15, the pastors will release a video that will better explain what return to indoor worship will look like. The goal is to provide as much information as possible so that when we gather for worship, the practices will feel familiar and not distracting. As we take this step forward, the pastors and church council ask for your patience, understanding, and prayers as we move forward.

Tuesday Prayer - 9am to noon

All Saints' Sunday

"All" includes some most beloved to us. "All Saints" calls to mind specific individuals: particular beloved faces, names and memories. This past year particularly grief, anxiety, frustration, and fear have certainly been prevalent. We may be all too aware of the particular names we are now carrying with us toward All Saints' this year—names of those who have died in the past months. All Saints' Sunday is always a chance to boldly remember we are a people of hope.

"All" includes those beloved by others.
"All Saints" creates a space that
embraces with honor the multitudes of
individuals among the beloved dead.
We see their faces, say their names,
and recognize in the worshipers around
us others who carry their own

memories and litanies of saints. All Saints sets out a place for all of them. All Saints brings into focus our own beloved dead while also stretching our imagination toward the whole company of saints, more diverse and populous than we can fully comprehend.

"All" are saved by grace. The festival originally honored those who were considered especially holy: heroic figures from the Scriptures and martyrs who had given their lives nonviolently in witness to the faith. However, it is an especially Lutheran accent for the feast to honor not only those who lived exemplary lives, but all who have been baptized into Christ's death. For Lutherans, All Saints resonates with the conviction that in Christ every saint is a sinner and every sinner a saint, *simul justus et peccator*. Lutherans especially remember on this

feast that it is God's grace, apart from our works, that makes us saints. We find lasting rest only in the mercy of God.

As the St. Philip congregation worships virtually this All Saints' Sunday on November 1, you are encouraged to set up a home worship space to enhance your worship experience. You can be as creative as you'd like with your space, but the pastors encourage you to include a candle to represent the light of Christ, a small bowl of water to remind you of your baptism, a cross, and pictures and/or written names of your loved ones who have now joined the Church Triumphant. May this worship space remind you that you are never alone and never without the love of God in Christ that unites us all.

Church Council News – October 2020

Council met on Tuesday, October 6, 2020 at 7:00 pm via Zoom.

Treasurer Peter Shick reports receipts for month ending September 30, 2020 of \$18,357.58, and year-to-date receipts of \$189,725.12. Expenses in September were \$23,455.17, and year-to-date expenses are \$172,605 27. Giving to the general fund is down

\$14,660.17 from this time last year. However, we have maintained a positive cash flow and anticipate ending the year by breaking even.

Council approved indoors worship to resume on Sunday, November 15 with one service beginning at 9:30 am. There will be limited seating in the Sanctuary with overflow seating in the Fellowship Hall. There will be new protocol for this service and the congregation will be notified of the details. Changes in the plans for this

service may change as needed. The online service will continue.

Council approved the Pastors to selection for the Portico Healthcare Silver Plan with a Health Savings Account.

A bid for \$7,994.00 was received and accepted from Carpetland to replace the carpet in the aisles, pulpit and altar areas in the sanctuary.

At St. Philip, we have experienced this harmony at least in part as we have been served by two extraordinary women: Pastor Kelly Bayer Derrick and currently by Pastor Laura Dunklin. At worship on Sunday, November 22 we will mark these special anniversaries as we gather (Rev. Elizabeth Platz was ordained in the Lutheran Church on November 22. 1970). We celebrate the power of God's Holy Spirit as we remember these significant happenings from our past and we celebrate God's Spirit calling us to continue to listen for new things Jesus does today. Please plan to be present online or in-person on November 22!

As we celebrate these powerful anniversaries, we also look forward to


the ways future leaders of the church will continue to enrich the whole church and its proclamation of the gospel. The ELCA has a scholarship program called "Fund for Leaders." The ultimate goal of this program is to fully fund the seminary educations of all ELCA students seeking rostered ministry. Pastor Laura was a recipient of a full-tuition scholarship through this program.

In recognition of these anniversaries and in a desire to support diverse leadership, Fund for Leaders has established two new scholarships named for the first white woman and woman of color (Rev. Earlean Miller) ordained in the Lutheran church. Priority will be given to Lutheran women and women of color for receiving these scholarships. St. Philip will be making a contribution to these scholarships. 
