COUNCIL NEWS

Council met on Tuesday, Nov. 11, at 7 p.m. in person and via Zoom.

- Ministry Associate for Worship and Engagement Donita Moore reported out from the post-worship meeting she hosted on Nov. 9. There was a good turnout with a lot of interest in both traditional and contemporary music.
- Treasurer Max Holland reported that October was a good month for offerings and investment income, but that good news was offset by unusual expenses for tree removal and HVAC repair. Solar panels continue to lower utility costs and bring in small but welcome revenue from selling renewable energy tax credits.
- Pastor David reported on his pastoral activities, including officiating at memorial services, holding the Blessing of Animals, helping out with the blood drive, and continued onboarding of the new office administrator and finalizing the hiring of the new Ministry Associate for Worship and Engagement.
 - Council approved a 2026 spending plan to present for discussion and a congregational vote at a Dec. 14 meeting.
 Council approved a 3% year-end bonus for Pastor David.

ST PHILIP ENDOWMENT GRANTS FOR MINISTRY

We are blessed. The St. Philip Endowment Fund is an incredible resource for ministry. During the past decade disbursements from this fund have made possible so much ranging from benevolent contributions to partners locally, nationally, and globally, to seed money for new ministries like our digital worship, to capital improvements, and much more.

The St. Philip Endowment Team now through the end of the year is receiving Endowment Grant Applications to consider for disbursements in the year 2026. It's the Thought that Counts by Rob Blezard

Jesus said, "Give, and it will be given to you." - Luke 6:38

Why is it so hard to find that all-too-elusive "perfect gift" for the loved ones in your life? For many of us, it's because they already have everything they need and most of what they want.

It sometimes feels impossible to find a gift that won't be banished to that closet for unwanted, unneeded, and unused presents -- alongside the loud ties, the strong perfumes, the unread books, and the garish sweaters. When it comes to gift-giving, it's often said, "It's the thought that counts." If that's true, why do we still put so much emphasis on the gift?

This year focus on the thoughts behind your Christmas gifts. Thoughts in keeping with the season. Thoughts of meeting real needs and giving where it will be much appreciated.

With so many disadvantaged people in the world, at least some of our Christmas budget would be well spent helping our needy neighbors.

If you are buying for a loved one who has everything, consider instead giving a monetary donation in their honor to a worthy charity that helps the poor. Some charities, such as Heifer International and ELCA Good Gifts, let you buy a specific item – such as a goat or pig for a family, or a water well for a village – to help people in the developing world.

Make the gift in your loved one's name or honor, and then describe it in a card attached to a low-cost "token" gift, such as a small box of chocolates or a bottle of wine. The better part of your gift will go to someone who truly needs it, and your loved one will share the joy of loving and helping your neighbors in need.
